DESCRIPTIONS OF INDIVIDUAL SERVICES IN THE VICTORIAN WOMEN'S HEALTH SERVICES PROGRAM



THE STATEWIDE WOMEN'S HEALTH INFORMATION SERVICES

Women in Industry and Community Health (established 1977) 83 Johnston Street Fitzroy 3065

For immigrant women, the migration experience, economic hardship, and cultural and language differences often add to the disadvantage they experience as women. WICH, the oldest Service in the Women's Health Services Program, attempts to address this double disadvantage.

WICH was initially established in 1977 under the name Action for Family Planing with the aim of taking health information to immigrant women working in factories. The program ran primarily on a voluntary basis until 1980. In 1982 it changed its name to Women in Industry: Contraception and Health. Throughout the 1980s and early 1990s the organisation received small amounts of funding from multiple sources. It was not until 1991 that programatic funding was granted under the National Women's Health Program.

Over time WICH grew to play an expanded role in addressing the health needs of NESB women. Accordingly it changed its name in 1992 to Women in Industry and Community Health. WICH now provides:

- a factory visits program delivered by a team of bilingual workers who take information to women at work in industry (see *Taking the health message* to women, page 30);
- community education involving the provision of information to women from NESB through workshops in community settings; radio programs and newsletter;

- a women's health resource centre shopfront pr viding multilingual information to women over the phone or on a drop in basis. While available to all women, the shopfront has an emphasis on addressing the needs of Vietnamese, Turkish and Spanish speaking women; and
- the representation of the needs of migrant women where required through government consultative processes, and so on.

WICH is managed by a committee of management elected annually. The Service has strong relationships with a range of health agencies including the Family Planning Association and Anti Cancer Council of Victoria as well as with unions, industry and with groups representing NESB women.

The Women's Health Resource Collective (established 1982) 653 Nicholson Street Carlton North 3054

The Women's Health Resource Collective develops and distributes women's health resources which are informed by women's experiences, are accessible and which promote choice.

Along with WICH, the Collective is one of the oldest services in the program, having its origins in 1982 in the formation of a small group of women interested in women's health issues.

In 1983 the group submitted successfully for funding under the Employment Initiatives Program (a job creation scheme) to establish a health resource and education project. It opened its first shopfront in that year. Like its sister Service WICH, the Collective spent the remainder of the decade dependent upon short term funding, with programatic funding being approved only as recently as 1988/89.

Prior to 1987, the Collective was one of only two Women's Health Services in Victoria. Despite inadequate levels of funding, the Service of necessity played a range of roles, including many of those which have now been taken up by other Services in the program (for example, the provision of telephone advice and referral, supporting women's self help groups). The advent of the Victorian Women's Health Services Program has allowed the Collective to concentrate its efforts on resource development and production - its area of particular expertise.

The Collective produces information in a variety of formats including pamphlets, booklets, posters and audio tapes. Resources are produced in cooperation with government and community organisations, Women's Health Services, individual women and community groups. The Service also plays an important role in facilitating the production of women centred resources in the wider community by providing support and advice to organisations in the area of resource production.

It distributes a wide range of women's health resources produced 'in house', by Women's Health Services interstate and by other organisations to government and community organisations, public and private health practitioners and health institutions, and to individual women.

The agency also advocates on behalf of women on health related matters by participating in consultative and project committees and campaigns on women's health issues.

The overall management of WHRC is undertaken by the management collective which is open to all women. Day today management is undertaken by the worker's collective.

The Collective has strong relationships with other Women's Health Services in Australia (to enable resource assessment and distribution), hospitals, community health centres, general practitioners, educational institutions, and women's and community groups.

Healthsharing Women (established 1988) 5th floor, Information Victoria 318 Little Bourke Street Melbourne 3000

In 1987 the Victorian government called for tenders to establish a statewide Women' Health Information Service. Healthsharing Women, a group of women representing a range of interests from across Victoria was successful. Established in July 1988 following extensive consultation with women, the Service now:

- has a health information and drop in service, providing specialist women's health information which encompasses both scientific and social aspects of women's health;
- has a health information library containing more than 6000 articles, books, journals and other references, combining medical, scientific, sociological and community-produced material;
- provides education and training to health professionals and allied health care workers, as well as groups of non-professional women, which is targeted to achieve more effective delivery of health services to women;
- monitors, evaluates and conducts research into women's health with a view to providing input where research proposals or studies demonstrate an insensitivity to, or overlook, women's health needs and concerns;
- assists community groups and agencies as well as individuals in planning and carrying out their own research;
- supports and resources new Women's Health Services and initiates and manages statewide health promotion projects;
- produces a newsletter, mailed out to over 1000 subscribers which features original, fully researched articles on women's health concerns along with reports of current issues in women's health.

The Service recognises and works to address the particular needs of women from non English speaking backgrounds, and rural and isolated women.

Healthsharing Women maintains links with a range of organisations and groups (see Appendix 3, page 84).

The Service is managed by a committee of management elected annually. Its members come from across Victoria and attempt to represent a range of interests including those of rural, Koori, disabled and NESB women.

THE REGIONAL WOMEN'S HEALTH SERVICES

The Women's Health Service for the West (established 1988) 60 Droop Street Footscray 3011

The Women's Health Service for the West (WHSFTW) was the first Regional Women's Health Service in the program to be established. Its origins lie in the efforts of two women's groups located in the western suburbs - the Flemington, Kensington and North and West Melbourne Women's Coalition and the Western Women's Health Network. The two groups came together in 1987 in response to a call from Health Department Victoria for tenders to establish a Women's Health Service. The tender prepared by the groups was successful and funding was allocated to conduct a consultation in the region with a view to developing aprofile for the Service, establishing links with other groups and services, determining a location for the Service and developing its first committee of management.

In 1988 the committee of management was formed and the Service became operational. The Service works within the localities of Sunshine, Footscray, Melton, Keilor, Essendon, Werribee, Altona, Bacchus Marsh, Williamstown, Flemington, Kensington and North and West Melbourne.

The WHSFTW's particular strengths lie in serving those groups of women who have traditionally had poor access to health services and which mainstream health services have perceived as 'hard to reach'. This includes women from NESB, low income women and women with disabilities. The emphasis on meeting the needs of these groups of women can be seen both in the programs provided by the Service as well as the way in which it involves women in all aspects of Service operation from membership of the committee of management, through to the planning and delivery of particular programs.

In its first year of operation, the Service provided centre based counselling and medical services. However, it became apparent that these programs were not being adequate! yused by women the Service aimed to target. Further while the WHSFTW was a regional Service, service users originated primarily from Footscray and its immediate surrounds. There were also concerns that women were tending to use the medical service in place of their local general practitioner service, rather than for defined women's health issues. This was not seen to be an efficient use of scarce women's health resources and could be

perceived to be duplicating what other local health Services were providing. The Service had long waiting lists for its services and its inability to meet demand was undermining goodwill among women in the region.

Following a Service review in 1990, the WHSFTW aimed to overcome these problems in service delivery by adopting project work as its primary mode of operation. This involves working with identified groups of women (for example, Spanish women) in theirown community. Local women themselves form a reference group and determine what their particular health needs are and the way they believe they should be addressed. The Service's current target groups are Spanish women, Arabic-Muslim women, Italian women and women with disabilities. This style of working is illustrated in the case study *Participation and Equity: The Key to Good Health* (see page 40).

The Service has maintained its role in regional planning, cooperative ventures with other agencies and involvement in issues of statewide relevance.

The Loddon Campaspe Women's Health Service (established 1989) 31 MacKenzie Street Bendigo 3550

Women in the Loddon Campaspe region began working to establish a Women's Health Service in 1988, when they were successful in attracting funds to conduct a consultation across the region. The report of the consultation, titled *A Stitch in Time*, fanned the basis for the development of the Service.

The staff of the Service are committed to valuing each woman who approaches the Service, whether by mail, telephone or in person. Women in the region are encouraged to become involved in the Service through its working groups, subcommittees and networks. The involvement of women in this capacity, together with use of the Service's programs by women means that paid workers at the Service can have contact with up to 150 women in any one day.

In the consultation particular concerns were raised by women in rural and remote communities about the lack of appropriate local services. Accordingly the inaugural committee of management made a commitment to allocating at least 60% of its resources to addressing the needs of these women. The Loddon Campaspe Women's Health Service's work in this area is illustrated in the case study *Reaching out to women in rural Victoria* (see page 44).

The Service also places particular emphasis on working with young women and women on low incomes and on addressing the issues of family violence and mental and emotional health.

The Outer East Women's Health Service (established 1990) 367 Maroondah Highway Ringwood 3134

The Outer East Women's Health Service was established as a joint initiative of the Maroondah Hospital's Women's Advisory Committee and the Outer Eastern Women's Health Network. The two groups formed a steering group which received funding to establish the Service. Consultation was conducted to discover the health needs of women in the area, gather information to determine the model for the Service and develop community networks. Following the location of premises in East Ringwood, the formation of a management committee and the appointment of workers, the Service became officially operational in January 1990.

The consultation conducted in the establishment phase of the Service indicated a particular demand for health information and for direct counselling and medical services in the region. The Service has responded to this demand with a number of innovative programs (see case study *More than just a health and support service for women*, page 47).

The Service works within Health Department Victoria Region Seven, primarily serving the localities of Ringwood, Croydon, Mooroolbark, Lilydale, Sherbrooke, Upper Yarra, Knox and Healcsville.

It works closely with other services and networks in the region including local government, government departments, women's groups, community health services, hospitals, neighbourhood houses and tertiary education institutions.

The Service is managed by a committee comprising both women from the community and representatives from other health and community agencies in the region. Wellcoming Women's Health Service (established 1991) 20 Darlot Street Horsham 3400; and 106 Doveton Street South Ballarat 3350

The aim of establishing a Women's Health Service in the Central Highlands Wimmera Region was formalised in 1985 when a meeting of interested women was called. Five years later funding was granted through the National Women's Health Program to consult with women in the region and determine how their needs could best be addressed by the Service. The inaugural committee of management was elected later in that year. The report of the consultation outlined directions for the Service and was widely distributed to women and community groups, networks and services. The first Co-ordinator was appointed early in 1991 and the Service commenced operations.

One of the significant challenges facing the Service is how it meets the needs of women across the region, particularly those who live in isolated rural communities. The region is large stretching from Ballan to the South Australian border, from north of Hopetoun to south of Edenhope. The case study *Sharing the load of caring* (see page 50) demonstrates the Service's obvious commitment to meet the challenge of extending its influence beyond the region's provincial cities and larger towns.

The Service's committee of management includes representation from across the region including the sub regions of Wimmera, the Grampians and Central Highlands. Programs are provided from two venues, one at Horsham and the other in Ballarat. Outreach workers have been appointed to serve the Grampians subregion and the Warracknabeal/Birchip area.



The North East Women's Health Service (established 1992) 76 Edwardes Street Reservoir 3073

The North East Women's Health Service provides health information, community education and referral, and has a focus on the particular needs of women from non-English speaking backgrounds.

The establishment of the North East Women's Health Service was an initiative of the North East Women's Health Network - a group of women living or working in Melbourne's Northern suburbs. With the assistance of the Preston/Northcote District Health Council and the Preston/Reservoir Migrant Resource Centre, the Network submitted successfully for funding to conduct a consultation with women and service providers in the region.

The Service which was officially opened in 1992, works in the municipalities of Preston, Northcote, Heidelberg, Diamond Valley, Eltham and Whittlesea. Its role in meeting the particular needs of women from NESB is given practical expression in bilingual programs and a wide collection of material in the community languages. In the first year of operation the Service prioritised nine community languages including Arabic, Croation, Greek, Italian, Macedonian, Serbian, Spanish, Turkish and Vietnamese. Anumber of the Service's priority issues are consistent with those identified in the National Non-English Speaking Background Women's Health Strategy as being of particular concern. These include occupational health and safety and mental health. Other priority issues for the Service include reproductive health and sexuality, the use of medication and the health concerns of young and older women.

Most of the Service's projects incorporate a resource production component in recognition of the shortage of appropriate resources and to ensure that the impact of the Service's work is enduring. For example, a recent project involving young Arabic and Turkish women resulted in the production of a booklet for use by teachers and workers who have contact with this group of young women.

The North East Women's Health Service is represented on the Austin Hospital and Preston and Northcote Community Hospital (PANCH) Advisory committees and the North East Metropolitan Psychiatric Services (NEMPS) Women's Advisory group. It is working to develop links with local general practitioners and psychiatrists.

Women's Health Service in the South East (established 1992) 34 Dandenong Road Frankston 3199

In 1990agroupofwomenmettoestablisha Women's Health Service for the south eastern region. Funds were received by the group through the National Women's Health Program in February 1991 to conduct a consultation in the region and establish links with other regional services and groups. The groups goals were realised in September 1992 with the opening of the Service.

WHISE is located in Frankston, but works within the South East Region from Port Melbourne to Portsea and to the east as far as Berwick and Wonthaggi. The Service is managed by a committee comprising women from the region. While a relatively new Service it has already begun work on a number of projects including a cooperative venture with hospitals in the region to raise awareness of women's health awareness in hospitals, page 54).

Gippsland Women's Health Service (established 1992) 48 Macalister Street Sale 3850

Late in 1990 representatives from the Strzelecki District Health Council, Monash University College, Gippsland and Moe/Narracan Community Health Centre, and women in the community formed a steering committee to establish a Women's Health Service in the Gippsland Region. With funding from the National Women's Health Program, the steering committee employed a project worker to undertake research and establish links with local people.

At the time of writing the Gippsland Women's Health Service was in its establishment phase. Nonetheless the Service has a number of sound achievements, including an extensive resource library; a 008 women's health information line and involvement in a project with the Anti Cancer Council of Victoria aimed at increasing the number of women having Pap tests.

The Service has a particular emphasis on working with geographically isolated women, women on farms, older women and Koori women. It has close links with a number of networks including the Farm Link Rural Women's Network and the Koori Women's Network. The Service is managed by an interim committee of management comprising two women from each of the sub regions: South, West, East and Central Gippsland, and Warratah.

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GLOSSARY OF TERMS



COMMUNITY

A specific group of people who live in a defined geographic area (for example, Western Suburbs of Melbourne), and/or share a common culture (for example, people from Vietnam or Italy), and/or exhibit some awareness of their identify as a group (for example, women'shealthgroupsordisability groups). The report also uses the term 'overall community' to refer to all people living in Australia.

COMMUNITY HEALTH SERVICES

Publicly funded primary health care services that have as a focus the health of specific communities. They include prevention and health promotion/education and community development programs, and local intersectoral cooperation. They may have primary medical and other personal care services, and they may have formal community participation at a variety of levels.

HEALTH

The World Health Organisation defines health as a state of complete physical, mental and social well-being, and not merely as the absence of disease and infirmity. It is recognised now that this is unrealistic, and recent definitions have tended to look at health more as a resource for everyday living. One way of looking at health is as a process, and that all people, whatever their state of ill health, can develop or improve their health.

HEALTH PROMOTION

Any combination of education and related organisational, economic and political interventions designed to promote behavioural and environmental changes to benefit health. This may cover a variety of strategies including legislation, health education, community development, advocacy, and so on.

HEALTH STATUS

Refers to the level of health experienced by an individual or a community by placing them/it along a continuum from health through distress, disease and disability to death. Health status is traditionally 'measured' by indicators such as mortality (death) rates, morbidity (sickness) rates, and health service use rates.

MAINSTREAM HEALTH PROVIDERS

Privately or publicly employed health professionals such as general practitioners, dietitians, chemists, psychiatrists, specialists, social workers or nurses.

MAINSTREAM HEALTH SERVICES

Publicly or privately funded health agencies or institutions which provide a range of specialist and generalist health services. They include psychiatric centres, nursing homes, public and private hospitals, drug and alcohol agencies, and so on.

l'vlainstreal'\11 Health System

The mainstream health system consists of a range of institutions and processes which impact on our health. Health policy, health research, health legislation and the various health institutions and industries are some aspects of the health system.

MEDICAL SERVICES

Used to cover all medical intervention including primary medical care and back up services such as hospitals and specialist services. Three broad levels of prevention have been identified.

- Primary preventing illhealth before it occurs.
 Work in this area is largely undertaken by a few publicly funded health and related services as well as social action movements.
- Secondary- early detection and intervention in health problems to arrest or retard existing disease.
 Work in this area of prevention is undertaken by a wide range of health and related practitioners.
 Secondary prevention has received increasing attention in recent years.
- Tertiary maintenance of people with chronic problems at an optimum level of functioning.

PRIMARY HEALTH CARE

The Social Health Office in South Australia defines primary health care as the first level of contact of the public with the health system blending personal care (for example, treatment, rehabilitative support, therapeutic interventions, and so on) with local efforts in the promotion of health, the prevention of illness and community development. When primary health care services are referred to in this report it is in this sense. This is not meant to devalue the significant primary health care that takes place in the informal settings of households, families, neighbourhoods and workplaces.

SOCIAL VIEW OF HEALTH

This recognises the impact (both direct and indirect) which physical, socio-economic and cultural aspects of the environment have on shaping the health of the community. A social view of health implies intervention to change those aspects of the environment which are promoting ill health, rather than continue to deal with illness after it appears, or continue to exhort individuals to change their attitudes and lifestyles when the environment in which they live and work gives them little choice or support for making such changes.

WOMEN'S HEALTH ISSUES

Women's health issues are those issues which exclusive! y or primarily concern women (for example, domestic violence) or which affect women differently as a result of their different position in Australian society (for example, occupational health and safety).

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
